

Patients can apply to have on-line access to the system which will allow them to view a summary of their medical records, book routine appointments and order repeat medication. To do this, complete a registration form either pick one up from reception or download it from our website <a href="www.waterbeachsurgery.co.uk">www.waterbeachsurgery.co.uk</a> and return it to Reception – you will need to bring ID with you so we can verify who you are for confidentiality reasons.

It will soon be time for your flu jabs, so if you are eligible e.g. over 65, asthmatic, have COPD, are pregnant, have heart disease, liable to strokes or are diabetic then please come to the surgery. Children aged 2, 3 and 4 (by 31<sup>st</sup> August) are also eligible - for free - using a nasal spray to protect against flu. We appreciate your continued support during this time as we rely on this as a major part of our income - especially when other funding streams are being cut. As a bonus this year - we are expecting Age UK here during our flu clinics so you may like to take advantage of their advice/help too. Please watch out for your invitation letter and we look forward to seeing you here at the surgery.

Did you know....we have a patient group who organise information and engagement events? Recently, the group have organised information on Diabetes, Asthma and Dementia which have been very informative. Details of the group can be found on the surgery website. Please watch out for forthcoming events advertised on village notice boards, surgery website and posters in the surgery.

# **Patient Participation Group**

Waterbeach PPG works with our doctors, nurses and support staff at our surgery to help them deliver the best possible care they can. A Core group of about 15 community members meet every 2 months to discuss with the Practice Manager what's new and any concerns patients have. Minutes are posted on the web-site, where lots of helpful information can be found. One of the current topics under discussion is to see if we can get a community warden to support elderly people in our community.

Four times a year we arrange Open Evenings covering topics like COPD, Diabetes and Dementia, to which anyone can come. They have proved very helpful to those who have attended. If you have any suggestions for future evenings please let us know.

The next Open Evening is on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> October at The Beach Social Club at 7.00pm.

The speaker will be from AGE UK and will tell us about all the help that is available for the over-65s. They can act as advocates for people on their own and help Carers access all the help that is available in the community. The talk will be about 40 minutes long and there will be time for questions and for individuals to raise personal issues at the end of the meeting.

# Message from Cllr. James Hockney

Local Plan delay - 'Waterbeach Barracks - No New Town' campaign update When I last wrote we were awaiting our turn at the Local Plan Independent Inspector Hearings and also said that nothing was inevitable. Since then the Planning Inspector has suspended the Local Plan inspection. In June a special meeting was convened regarding this at the District Council (a YouTube video of the meeting can be viewed at www.youtube.com/watch?v=odrqQ-UYP-I). As ever I stood up for our community with Councillor Johnson at the meeting. South Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridge City Council have announced a new consultation process. This will mean the Planning Inspection process will not resume until next year.

I have consistently and firmly opposed the town over the last 15 years, this includes; voting against the Local Plan, launching the last three campaigns against the town, taking part in countless media interviews and founding the facebook page - www.facebook.com/waterbeachbarracksnonewtown.

This has been a long fight for our community over the years. We must press on and ensure the town is rejected for a fourth time.

Improving School Road Safety - 'Action for School Road Safety' - I would like to say a big thank you to all the residents that signed the petition. In all over 1,300 signed the petition which is a great amount and will send a clear message to the County Council.

The community has already successfully secured the County Council re-instating priority gritting of the Secondary School bus route (Landbeach to Cottenham road). This was a hard fought victory with many parents also directly pressing the County Council on the issue. For me it was always about holding the responsible body - the County Council directly to account and as a community we succeeded. The 'Action for School Road Safety' still has three of the four aims to achieve so we will not rest on our laurels. The remaining three aims are;

- 1. Recruit a Primary School crossing person and put in place an actual crossing.
- 2. Add the Primary School to a safer routes to school scheme.
- 3. Ensure parents' concerns about the quality/standard of County Secondary School buses are addressed.

On all three of these issues I have been in contact with the County Council, local schools and many parents. In addition we have put posters up in shops around Waterbeach to promote the need for a crossing person at the Primary School.

Infrastructure and flooding - Multi-agency approach on Bannold Road drainage and sewage - Many residents in Bannold Road, Waterbeach have suffered from sewage backing up onto their property after heavy rainfall. This is unacceptable and I have been chasing for a multi-agency meeting since last year. I am delighted to report that at long last there was an onsite meeting in late August bringing together agencies, residents and councillors.

This is the start of the process. I will be chairing a follow up multi-agency meeting

this month at South Cambridgeshire District Council bringing together all the key parties to identify the problem(s) and a plan to remedy this.

The misery that many on Bannold Road have had to endure has gone on for far too long. Residents rightly want action and I will do my utmost to help.

**Localism in action - Waterbeach Neighbourhood Plan -** It is fantastic that South Cambridgeshire District Council agreed to the Waterbeach Neighbourhood Plan that will cover the full parish of Waterbeach.

The Planning Portfolio Holder (the decision maker) Councillor Turner commented on the good number of passionate responses to the consultation and the barrage of lobbying from myself and Councillor Johnson. I know that there were issues with the online consultation system, and pressure from myself and others resulted in an extension to the online consultation system. The main thing was that our community secured the right result despite objections from new town developers Urban & Civic (U&C) and Royal London Waterbeach (RLW).

The Parish Council and many residents put a significant amount of work into bringing the Neighbourhood Plan forward and certainly deserve our thanks for these efforts.

I cannot underline the significance of the Localism Act bringing forward the Neighbourhood Plan concept for communities like ours. It will mean for instance; more funding, having legal force over non-strategic elements of the Local Plan and giving us a much greater say in shaping our community in areas such as planning and transport.

**Preserving our history - Landbeach Tithe Barn -** Work continues apace with securing the long term future of this wonderful building and raising funds to restore it.

Tithe Barns are rare, Landbeach is the only one in Cambridgeshire and unique in the UK with having its original floor still in place.

Chairing the emerging Tithe Barn Trust is a real pleasure with a great team of local residents offering many different skills.

Fundraising continues to go well and we have over £60,000 in donations, pledges and grant funding. To fully restore the building, including repairing the roof, we need to raise around £250,000 in total.

Thank you to the local firm Cosworth who helped with a spring and summer cleaning of the building prior to our open days in April and August. These open days raised hundred pounds in funds and many signed up for 'Friends of Landbeach Tithe Barn' membership.

The building is owned by South Cambridgeshire District Council with whom we are working closely with on this important part of our history.

Local housing need - Empty accommodation on Barracks site - I have contacted both Urban & Civic (site managers of the former barracks site) and the

District Council about all the empty accommodation blocks.

These could be put to use rather than just sitting empty. Urban & Civic are continuing to explore options for the reuse and refurbishment of a range of the buildings on site.

Whilst nothing is guaranteed I will always look at different options to help provide homes to meet the local housing need. I have been successful in bringing the MoD and District Council together to secure Park Crescent as the first local connection housing scheme in Waterbeach. With local connection housing those on the council housing waiting list with a local connection are placed at the front of the queue. This was a dream come true for many including one local person who secured a home in Park Crescent after being on the waiting list for eight years. I want more successes for our community like this.

**Supporting good causes - Charity fundraiser at Bollywood Spice -** Over the years I have organised many charity events at home and at the restaurant Bollywood Spice. The next event will support; Waterbeach Toddler Playgroup, Arthur Rank Hospice Charity and Addenbrookes Neonatal care unit (SCBU/NICU). This Charity Gala Dinner will be held at Bollywood Spice on October 1<sup>st</sup> and tickets are already sold out. If you would like to donate a raffle prize, auction item or make a donation then please do let me know.

Working for the community - 15 years of service - It does not seem possible that I have been a Councillor for 15 years in the local community. I was initially a Landbeach Parish Councillor from 2000 and then was elected as a District Councillor to represent Waterbeach Ward (Waterbeach, Landbeach and Chittering) in 2004. During this time I have always done my best for the local community going forward.

# **Beach Churches Together**


This summer, Beach Churches Together got chilly with their Polar Explorers Holiday Club.

# **Library News**

Waterbeach Independent Library continues to attract new members weekly, which is very refreshing news, plus we are bucking the trend of dropping numbers of individuals using libraries in other parts of the country. With the recent



government announcement of their commitment to forwarding the objective of ensuring all children attend a library, to assist the literacy rates in this country, it seems Waterbeach Independent Library is already working toward this aim with considerable success.

To confirm this trend, we have approximately 150 children registered on the Summer Reading Challenge "Record Breakers" this year - which is quite something for a small independent library operating on £3,500 per year. For those who may have just joined our community, Library funding is made up as follows - £2K to the local school for the use of the Community Room, £1K for general administration - paper, printer ink etc. and £500 for new books for the Reading Challenge. This is paid via the Parish Council, who receive the precept from the taxes you pay to the government. Waterbeach Library is run totally by volunteers and we tend to be extremely frugal, so we hope you consider you are receiving good value for your taxes.

The refurbishment of the Library is now virtually completed, the mess cleared up, books returned and by the time you read this everything will be back to normal. The work was only possible by the Library being involved, as it was carried out by Sanctuary Housing under the payback to the community scheme. Hills Builders built the new hostel in the village and in return they undertake a community project. They contacted the Library, there were lots of discussions as to what was required, and finally, after many months of meetings, innumerable emails and concerns, the work was completed. So our thanks to Hills Builders and Sanctuary Housing. Also enormous thanks to the Volunteers at the Library who did all the hard work of moving masses of books, then replacing them all again after suitable cleaning. Without them nothing could have been achieved. Special thanks go to Councillor David Smart, who, with the assistance of Will Crane, managed to repair and reassemble furniture which did not like being moved.

Their help was invaluable.

During the past four months three young gentlemen Library members have undertaken their Scouts Library Badge with us, and are now proudly wearing their badges so congratulations to Noah, Isaac and Luke.

So the Library is still progressing, which is due to the hard work of the Volunteers, but also the recognition by the Community as to how important

books and reading skills are in this world today. If visiting us you will find we are not a "shushy" type of Library (that word was used by a child who visits regularly) - we are just not that kind of library. # **Thank You Bunny Wilson**

Bernard or Bunny, as we all knew him, and his wife Ricarda came to Waterbeach about 12 years ago when he retired. He was not a person to let grass grow under his feet or under other people's and offered his services as a gardener and general handyman to pensioners at very low rates of pay. When the Beaches Community car scheme restarted about five years ago Bunny became one of the stalwarts of it.

'Can I help you?' his response when he picked up the telephone, was music to the ears of a hard pressed a Car Scheme coordinator trying to find a driver at short notice or to plan ahead for a busy week. He never said no unless he was already committed to something and over the years drove thousands of miles taking residents to hospital, surgery and social trips both locally and sometimes further afield. Despite his own health problems which meant that he had to give up the gardening and heavier handyman duties some time ago, he continued to drive until earlier this year when he became too ill to continue and he died only a couple of months after he stopped.

Thank you Bunny for your ever cheerful willingness to help, you are missed by coordinators and passengers alike.

The Community Car scheme provides an essential service for people in the village who have no other means of transport. Priority is given to medical appointments but we try to find drivers for social visits which enable elderly people to get out of their homes. We are always looking for volunteer drivers and it is a very rewarding and flexible form of volunteering. There is no regular time commitment required; drivers are asked if they can do a trip and are free to say yes or no. Bunny was exceptional for the amount of driving he did; even if a volunteer can only do the occasional journey, it is very much appreciated by passengers and coordinators alike. A mileage allowance is paid. A DBS check is required (arranged by the scheme) and car insurers must give permission.

# **News from Cllr. Peter Johnson**

**Pedestrian Crossing** - The project officer has made several recommendations regarding this with everything looking quite favourable so far. With the moving of the Post Office in the late autumn it does add significant importance to getting a safe means of crossing the road and I do keep pressing the issue with the relevant parties

**Former Barracks Site -** Planning permission has been granted for the squash courts and sports hall to be used by Waterbeach residents once the security issue has been addressed. It does appear that the Museum will have a place on the site as well.

The fishing lake is proving to be a bigger hurdle than was thought earlier but all parties are determined to achieve the desired result, it is just taking a bit longer than we all thought. I did attend the 514 Squadron Reunion earlier in June with a Church service at 11am which was quite moving. This was followed with everyone relocating to the Barracks and the museum. We should have witnessed a flypast however terrible weather prevented that from happening but we did manage to visit the Memorial Garden. It was good to chat to so many people with fond memories of Waterbeach over a wonderful lunch and I hope that we get another reunion next year, but with better weather.

The Local Plan & Neighbourhood Plan - Well we all know that the inspector has suspended the hearings on the Local Plan so that issues causing concern can be looked at by South Cambs District Council. In the meantime many people have been working on a Neighbourhood Plan and the area it should cover. It was suggested the whole of the Parish and this has been accepted by South Cambs. This will give us a bit more say in planning applications that come in for the Barracks area and give us a seat at the table for negotiations with benefits for our village.

**Station Car Park** - How long can this drag on I ask myself, Network Rail are so difficult to deal with and incredibly slow at responding to e-mails and their last letter was to say they had produced a business case but it was too expensive so they are thinking it out again how to achieve this car park. I have requested that a site meeting is held so that all parties are aware of problems and how they can be addressed. One of the party involved has agreed to this but cannot make it until 21<sup>st</sup> or 22<sup>nd</sup> September, the fight goes on......

**Speed watch** - I have now managed to assemble a Speedwatch team here in Waterbeach with 9 volunteers. The initial training has taken place and we are now planning our first exercise in the village. The equipment we are using

to start with is loaned to us by the police but there are plans to buy the equipment and share the cost with Horningsea and Fen Ditton as they have Speedwatch teams and it makes sense to share the equipment as the cost is approx. £3000. My aim is to reduce the amount of speeding motorists that race through our village and make it a safer village.

**Gritting** - Thanks to all who wrote to the County Council which gave support to the pressure I kept applying to the officers at the County Council that this was a most important issue and should not be ignored. I am sure that the petition raised and signed by many also helped and common sense prevailed in the end and the road will be gritted when we have bad weather that justifies gritting. This all followed from the initial meeting I instigated with County Council Officers last year so it shows decisions can be changed.

**Primrose Lane** - Well inspections have taken place and then stalled, I am frustrated to say the least but I will continue to chase whoever I need to chase as I find a lack of action totally unacceptable. The latest news is that a decision will be made in September on the most appropriate surface/materials with the necessary work carried out as soon as possible.

Flooding & Drainage Issues - On Wednesday 26th August I attended a meeting which was held on Bannold Road to see what can be done to improve the situation we have at present. This meeting was arranged by Pat Matthews who is the South Cambs Drainage Manager. This was due to pressure from many people and the video that was circulated in July showing the effects of heavy rainfall creating a fountain from one of the drain covers. Representatives attending were from Anglian Water, Cambridgeshire County Council, South Cambs District Council Planning Dept., plus Parish Councillors and members of the public who have been affected by flooding on several occasions. There will be a follow up meeting where results of this meeting and actions to be taken will be discussed.

# Fire and Rescue Service



Winter is coming and after seeing a rise in chimney fires last year, Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is encouraging all residents to get their chimney professionally swept before the cold sets in.

Top tips to enjoy an open fire safely:

- Sweep your chimney at least once a year and get brickwork inspected, especially the chimney breast and roof space.
- Do not bank fires too high or overload the grate, and remember to let them burn down well and check the hearth before going to bed.
- Use a fire or spark guard to prevent accidental fires.
- Do not place objects on or over the mantle-piece which may cause you to stand too close to the fire to reach or use them.
- Burn only suitable fuels and avoid burning resinous woods as soot builds up quickly.

The Barracks Museum was set up by 39 Engineer Regiment to commemorate the men and women that served at RAF Waterbeach Station from its opening in 1941 until 1966, and also those in the Army (Royal Engineers) from 1966 to 2013. Much of the material in the Museum was donated by members of 514 Squadron RAF who flew Lancasters from Waterbeach during the Second World War, and who continue to have an annual reunion in the village. In 2013 the Army donated the whole collection to a newly formed charitable trust "Waterbeach Military Heritage Museum".

# The Cambridgeshire Regiment

The village of Waterbeach is strongly linked with the Cambridgeshire Regiment and during the Great War many of the young men from the village and surrounding area served in it. The Regiment was formed in 1908 and unlike most regiments of the time it was only a Territorial Force unit with no Regular Army battalions. This meant it



was made up of non-professional part-time volunteers who lived and worked locally but attended weekly drill nights as well as an annual training camp. At times of national emergency they would be called up for home defence but would only serve overseas if they specifically volunteered to do so.

Several men from the village joined the Cambs during a highly successful recruiting drive in January 1914. Shortly after war was declared in August men across the county answered their country's call and those from Waterbeach were no exception. On the 7<sup>th</sup> September a large group of around twenty young men from the village travelled to Cambridge and enlisted in the Cambs. Nearly all these men waived their right to serve at home and volunteered for overseas service. Other local men volunteered and joined up as the war continued on.

For many of the men who joined the Cambs early in the war their first experience of the trenches and the front line came shortly after the 1/1st Battalion went over to France on the 14th February 1915. They were initially moved into the Ypres Salient in Flanders and the men from the village suffered their first casualty a month later on the 14th March 1915 when William Andrews was killed at the fighting around a village call St Eloi.

Ten men from the village were killed or died of wounds whilst serving with the Cambs and at least another fourteen were wounded. One young man named Frank Levitt of "The Willows", Waterbeach was awarded the Military Medal for his bravery after he tried repeatedly, despite poisonous gas and great personal danger, to rescue three men trapped and buried in a tunnel underground.

A wealth of information on the Cambridgeshires including its origins, its organisation, the men who joined, the medals and insignia, and a month-by-month breakdown of the Battalion's service during the war can be found on our website at the link below. 

Cambridgeshire County Council offers foster carers comprehensive training, 24 hour support and generous allowances. Carers can also earn additional payments as they develop their skills and experience.

# Crimestoppers



#### Cambridgeshire Crimestoppers Tackling Crime on Your Doorstep

The independent crime-fighting charity Crimestoppers is reminding the residents across Cambridgeshire to be aware of doorstep crime during the long days of summer and autumn and to report any suspicious activity. Doorstep criminals typically employ a number of ruses to gain the confidence of victims before defrauding or stealing from them. They will also target the more vulnerable members of our communities.

Between May 2014 and April 2015 there were over 500 instances of suspected rogue trading reported to Cambridgeshire Police.

The most common types of doorstep criminals are those more commonly known as a 'rogue traders'. These criminals masquerade as genuine businesses and set out to deliberately overcharge for unsatisfactory goods or services.

Typical services preferred by rogue traders are driveway maintenance, pressure-washing, gardening, roofing and guttering.

Rogue traders rarely offer the statutory 14 day cooling off period applicable for work costing more than £42, often insist on large amounts of cash up front and can be intimidating. Once they have found a victim they often return in the future under a new guise.

Another group of doorstep criminals are those who trick their way into victims' houses with the intention of stealing any valuables they can find within. These 'distraction burglars' often pose as workmen who ask to check something in the house and whilst left alone they, or an accomplice, will look for something easy to steal, such as cash, a handbag or jewellery. Among the most common of the excuses offered are needed to check the water supply and searching for a lost pet or ball.

How to deal with unexpected and unwanted visitors on your doorstep Remember the following 4 principles:

**LOCK**: Ensure you keep exterior doors and windows locked.

**STOP**: Before you answer the door, stop and think whether you are expecting anyone.

**CHAIN:** Put the door bar or chain on. Look through the spyhole or the window to see who it is. Always keep the bar or chain on while you are talking to the person on the doorstep.

**CHECK**: Ask for and carefully check the caller's ID card as all genuine callers will always carry one. If they do not have an ID card then do not let them in.

Doorstep callers are adept at high pressure sales techniques. They will catch you unawares. They are polite, persistent and persuasive and they will rush you to make a decision. Say "No thank you" and then immediately close the

door. Always get three quotes from recommended traders before you go ahead with home maintenance work.

There are few better crime prevention measures than having good neighbours. If you live close to an elderly or vulnerable person you can volunteer to be a Nominated Neighbour. This is an informal Trading Standards scheme whereby if a vulnerable person receives an unexpected caller they can immediately direct them to a trusted neighbour. Details of how to set up a scheme can be found at www.tradingstandards.gov.uk/ncwinfo. Good neighbours can also assist with reporting any suspicious activity in the

Good neighbours can also assist with reporting any suspicious activity in the local community and this is where Crimestoppers can assist as it allows the public to report crime or suspicious activity completely anonymously any time of the day or night.

Cambridgeshire Crimestoppers are keen to gather information to enable the police and Trading Standards to investigate and prevent doorstep crime.

Local Chairperson Lisa Oddy states: "Doorstep crime victimises the most vulnerable members of the community and we want to put a stop to it in Cambridgeshire. If you know of anyone undertaking such activity or have seen suspicious persons or vehicles in your neighbourhood please let us know, completely anonymously, so together we can tackle this criminality." If you have any information about crime or criminals, please call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111. No one will ever know who you are. # Keep Waterbeach Rural

#### Local Plan - Inquiry Update Autumn 2015

As you will probably be aware by now the Inspector has officially suspended the Local Plan Inquiry until March 2016. This is because more detailed information has been requested by the Planning Inspector from South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge City to enable them to decide if the Plan is sound.

Some of the major issues raised by the Inspector is the sustainability of new settlements such as those proposed at Waterbeach and Bourn. It has been identified by the inspector that the City/SCDC need 29,000 affordable homes out of the total 33,000 new build proposed for the area. As you can imagine there is much work for our local Councils to do. Let's not even get started on our already congested roads and public services creaking at the seams!!!!

In the meantime Waterbeach Parish Council together with members of the community have started the process of formulating a Neighbourhood Plan which will give us a say as to how our villages are shaped in the future. SCDC have agreed that we can keep our existing Parish boundary which includes Waterbeach, barracks land and Chittering. Urban & Civic and RLW Estates who wish to develop Waterbeach New Town (includes the barracks land and prime green field land and could accommodate 12,000+ dwellings) objected to our proposals. They now have to acknowledge that we do exist and will need to negotiate and consult with us from now on.

As I write Urban & Civic will be presenting their planning proposals to Waterbeach Parish Council on Tuesday 1st September. Previously they had said that they would adhere to the Inspectors decision regarding the Local Plan. In the Local Plan 1,400 dwellings would be required by 2031. What are Urban & Civic proposing and how will it affect our villages and infrastructure? Nigel Hugill of Urban & Civic clearly stated at a meeting in the village that there would be very few affordable homes within the new development. If you click on this link here is their vision of Waterbeach New Town which would look fine in an urban environment but is it appropriate in a rural environment such as ours? # **Stop Loan Sharks**

**Do you know someone who's swimming with sharks?** They may not have fins or killer jaws, but loan sharks – or illegal moneylenders – are every bit as dangerous and predatory as their name suggests.

Victims are not only charged astronomical rates of interest, but very often face violence, intimidation or blackmail if they fall behind with their payments. Great news - a specialist Trading Standards team is helping to hunt down the illegal money lenders.

What is a loan shark? A loan shark is someone who lends money without the permission required by the Financial Services & Markets Act 2000. Permission is granted by the Financial Conduct Authority to individuals or companies whom they believe are "fit and proper".

**Loan Sharks - Dispelling the Myths** One of the things that has become apparent is that there are lots of myths around loan shark activities that have no truth whatsoever. For example:

- MYTH There's nothing you can do about loan sharks
- FACT It is illegal for anyone to operate a money lending business if they do not have permission from the Financial Conduct Authority
- MYTH You have to pay back what the loan shark says you owe
- FACT A loan made by an illegal money lender (without a license) is unenforceable without permission from the Financial Conduct Authority. This means that you cannot legally be made to pay it back.
- MYTH If you borrow from a loan shark, you commit an offence
- FACT It is the loan shark who is behaving illegally. Reporting the loan shark's activity will not get you into trouble with the authorities.
- MYTH Loan sharks provide a reasonable priced service
- FACT The average cost of borrowing from a loan shark is three times the
  price of the highest cost of legal credit. The highest interest rate the team
  have come across so far was 131,000% APR. One victim was receiving
  benefits of £74 per week. The loan shark took £50 a week, leaving just £24
  to live on.

#### How can you help?

- 1. Talk to your friends and family about loan sharks ask them if they know of any loan sharks operating in your area.
- 2. Tell us! The only way we can help is if we know about the problem. You don't have to give us your name or sign an official statement if you don't want to. If you or someone you know is a victim of a loan shark operating in your area, contact Trading Standards Illegal Money Lending Team in strictest confidence: 24 hour confidential hotline 0300 555 2222 or text 'loan shark + your message' to 60003. 
