County Councillor's Report

By the time you read this, the first part of the road resurfacing in Station Road should have been done. The county council decided to take advantage of the closure of the road and the level crossing to do the work to that end of Station Road. The remainder of the resurfacing work, up to the church corner, and the work to make the pavement level again, is due to be done in February.

Resurfacing work is also planned for Cody Road and the Capper Road estate. I am pleased that some of the worst pot holes in Winfold Road have been filled, but I have also asked for the resurfacing of Winfold Road to be included in the schemes for the next six-month period, summer 2014.

The consultation for the A10 crossing for the Landbeach cycleway has now been completed. We are still waiting for the final proposals to be agreed. The work on the crossing is due to start In January. As part of that work new lines are to be painted at the Landbeach end of the cycleway to remind cyclists that the dual-use finishes and they should cycle on the road rather than the pavement in the village.

The County Council's main pre-occupation at the moment is next year's budget. The indications are that the grant the council receives from the government will be cut again this year (and for each of the next five years!). This means that the council is anticipating cuts to its services as well as an increase in Council Tax. The Council tax increase is likely to be fractionally under 2% next year. The services being considered for cuts include children's centres and care for dependent adults. Once again there is unlikely to be enough money spent on road maintenance to prevent them deteriorating further. We are working on proposals to reduce the cuts to front-line services by identifying economies in other areas such as offices, energy use and greater co-operation between councils.

The old school site on Cambridge Road (more recently called the IT Centre) is currently being offered for sale by the County Council. The Parish Council was given first refusal but decided not to buy it.

The long-awaited covered cycle racks at the station car park have been installed at last. Although they are very welcome, judging by the number of cycles still being locked to the railings in front of Lodeside Mobile Home Park, there are not enough of them! I will be suggesting that additional racks should be provided in the car park extension proposed for the yard between the present car park and the up (southbound) platform.

Work is progressing with the new street lights in Landbeach. As in Waterbeach, on the whole this seems to be fairly satisfactory, with one or two issues still outstanding. If you have a particular problem, and Balfour Beatty are not able to sort it out for you, do let me know.



Library News

The Waterbeach Independent Library has had a busy summer with many visitors and considerable activity surrounding the Summer Reading Challenge. Seventy two children registered



for the Challenge, 70 completed by reading six books over the summer period, but many children read far more books. On Monday 8th November 62 students of Waterbeach Community School were presented with their certificates and medals at morning assembly. The remaining 8 students were from a variety of schools - Milton School, Perse Girls School, Perse Preparatory, St Lawrence Roman Catholic School and Fulbourn Pre-School. Whilst the number of children completing the Challenge was fantastic, one other fact was quite outstanding, that being there were 37 boys and 33 girls completing. It is accepted it proves more difficult to engage boys in reading than girls, therefore the numbers are usually higher for girls than boys, but we have bucked the trend, something we are extremely pleased about. At the Library we work hard to engage children with books, to enjoy books, and enter the Reading Challenge which offers recognition of their efforts. We have attempted to identify the types of books our young readers engage with and bring those into the Library, it appears to have been successful. It is not about numbers it is to ensure young people appreciate being able to read opens up a world of opportunity. So to see the youngsters faces as they collect their certificates and medals was fantastic. The Library will take a pat on the back, but we have also to thank the parents who recognise the need for literacy and encourage their children to read on a regular basis. We also need to acknowledge the teachers and Heads at Waterbeach School and all the other schools who have reading at the top of their priority list, who manage to enthuse young people with such curiosity and imagination whilst battling the standards and statistics they encounter every day Thanks to the parents and schools, you have done a great job, but most importantly enormous congratulations to the young people, who are the stars of our Community.

The Babies and Books on a Friday afternoon appears to be gathering pace as we head into the dark evenings, allowing parents to bring their young ones into the Library at 2.15pm onwards on a Friday to read books and enjoy the atmosphere before collecting siblings from school. Book deliveries to homes has also proved useful to a small number of people who have been house bound for a variety of reasons.

The Library continues to welcome a different Year Group for a half a term from Waterbeach Community School every Friday afternoon providing the students an opportunity to select a book of their choice, to view the Library display which aligns with the various projects they undertake, plus an opportunity for discussion. On Monday the 8th November we were pleased to welcome Jill Terrell, the new Head of Libraries, and Marjorie Smith in charge of LAPS, from the County Library service to view our Library. They were both very impressed with the Library, but also with the numbers we had engaged within the Reading Challenge. We are all pleased the Library is going from strength to strength, welcoming more members weekly which is quite impressive as the general trend is a falling in numbers. If you would like to keep in touch with the Library just look for us on Facebook, we have a lively page.

Waterbeach Library is located in the Community Room on the Waterbeach School site. If you already have a Cambridgeshire Libraries card this can be used at Waterbeach, or you can join at Waterbeach Library to enjoy all the benefits of all Cambridgeshire Libraries. We can order books from other libraries for you, or you can order them online, for collection at Waterbeach. Books borrowed from other Cambridgeshire libraries can be returned to Waterbeach.

The Library is open on Monday 10-12noon and 3pm-5pm, Wednesday 6-8pm, Friday 2.30pm-5.30pm and Saturday 10-12noon.

Mobile Library visit - The mobile library calls once a month, on the second Monday, so forthcoming dates are 9th December, 13th January, 10th February and 10th March.

Cow Hollow Wood

Have you been down to the wood today or recently by Waterbeach railway station?

During 2013 a good deal of work has taken place.

In contrast to 2012 all the rides and open spaces have been well cut making a more user friendlier wood. A place to walk, picnic, play games, explore or just sit on one of the new seats and enjoy the wood and wildlife around you. In 2012 the Woodland Trust in conjunction with the children from Waterbeach Community School, named various areas of the wood or the gates. Sign posts have been erected directing visitors to places or gates. We have Mouse Gate and the Green Giant Gate (painted green) an osier bed and the Explorers area for games and picnicking. The osier bed is to be made larger to show what one is like. There were many round Waterbeach in the past and can be seen on the old maps.

University The of Cambridge architectural students designed, project managed and built a Living Willow Bridge across the ditch running through the the middle of wood. Coincidentally at the point where the children built one when I organised the celebrating decade а (2010) of the wood planted in 2000. Three wonderfully carved seats have been



placed in the wood for your enjoyment recently.

Unfortunately some of the ash trees have ash die back which is under surveillance. No ash is to be moved out of the wood to prevent the spread. We want you to enjoy Cow Hollow Wood so please give me, Adrian Wright a ring should you see any wildlife of interest and of course any damage or litter. Trees and branches or bushes can sometimes fall across the paths so let me know so they can be cleared.

If you have not been to the wood recently take time to walk in there and enjoy the peace. It would make a nice Christmas or New Year walk! Message from Cllr. James Hockney

I am pleased to update you on some of the issues that I have been working on for the good of the local community - Waterbeach, Landbeach & Chittering.

Waterbeach Barracks and the Local Plan - Thank you to everyone that responded to the Local Plan consultation. Both Councillor Johnson and I have worked very hard to represent the community view to South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC).

This includes;

1. Attending the three exhibitions held in the community.

2. Making the case at SCDC meetings leading up to the consultation including Cabinet on June 27th, the Portfolio Holders meeting on June 11th and Workshop 4 meeting 'How Many Homes? Where? And 'Last Issues for the Plan' on May 14th.

3. Making countless phone calls and e-mails to SCDC.

4. Meeting with the key decision makers at SCDC.

5. Attending the Keep Waterbeach Rural August meeting.

6. Sending in a formal representation to SCDC in response to the Local Plan Consultation.

Councillor Johnson and I have launched the last three campaigns against the Town. To be clear, we both have consistently opposed the Town and have been fighting this issue for over a decade. That said, the Barracks land cannot remain derelict. The debate is very much what will happen to the land. Surely a smaller scale development on the built area, as a village extension, is a better idea. This could be brought forward sooner, which would help to meet the housing need and help our local economy.

The Facebook page <u>www.facebook/waterbeachbarracksnonewtown</u> continues to grow in support with a record number of 'likes' and visits. It is the largest Waterbeach Ward related page on Facebook - which clearly underlines the community feeling on the issue. Thank you for all your support. We are strongest when we are united on this issue.

A10 Safer Junctions Petition – Resulting in action! - On September 10th I was invited by the County Council to make the case for action on these two junctions. This follows the handover of the petition on August 29th, signed by over 1,200 local residents to ClIr. Mac McGuire (Highways Portfolio Holder) at Cambridgeshire County Council Shire Hall. The petition calls for action to make the two junctions at Landbeach/Milton and Waterbeach/Landbeach safer.

Following the meeting, Councillor Mac Maguire personally wrote to me crediting the petition with prompting; (1) The consultation for improving the Landbeach/Milton junction (2) Leading to a review of the Landbeach/Waterbeach junction.

Although road safety is a County Council issue, Councillor Johnson and I (as your District Councillors) have taken on many County Council issues in addition

to our District Council workload.

Substantial demand for the former MoD properties - It is great to see the former MoD properties starting to be occupied. At the time of writing, Annington Homes have reported to me that the first two releases of homes are occupied or reserved. Clearly welcome news for the local economy.

To speed up the transfer of the properties in the first place (from the MoD to Annington Homes), I organised and chaired two multi agency meetings on the issue. I will do everything I can to help support the local economy.

As you may be aware, Annington are releasing the properties on a phased basis. This means it could be over a year before all the homes are occupied. But at least the process has now begun.

'Shop Local, Shop Waterbeach & Landbeach' Scheme - With the Barracks closure it is more important than ever that we support our local community businesses. This is why I have been working so hard to build the 'Shop Local' campaign. The Facebook page <u>www.facebook.com/shopwaterbeachward</u> - is a free way for local business to promote themselves – support for the page is growing with record numbers visiting the page – as many as 1,000 people per week.

In addition, at the time of writing, I am busy organising a Waterbeach Ward business summit to work with shop owners to look at ways of building the 'Shop Local' scheme. I will update you in my next article about this meeting.

Pharmacy/Village Stores Crossing - I am delighted that the Waterbeach Parish Highways committee has been reintroduced. I always found this committee to be a great way of bringing together Waterbeach Parish, County and District Councillors.

Councillor Johnson and I have run many petitions on road safety issues. This includes the 'Pedestrian Road Safety' petition, which directly led to plans being produced to improve the road safety along by the Pharmacy and Village Stores. The issue has been getting together the funding required to make this happen. I have always said such a scheme needs to include time limited parking opposite the Village Stores. We really must see action sooner rather than later. *Charity Fundraisers -* This year I have organised three coffee mornings at my home. These were in aid of local charities; Waterbeach and Landbeach Action for Youth (£175 raised), East Anglian Children's Hospices (£315 raised) and the Shetland Welfare Pony Trust Landbeach (£120 raised).

Advice from Trading Standards

Plagued by nuisance calls?

Recent figures released by the Communications Regulator, OFCOM, show that around 10,000 unsolicited marketing calls and 3,000 silent calls are received by UK consumers every month. The majority of these calls are made between 8am and 6pm Monday to Friday.

As well as interrupting whatever you are doing at the time, many such callers use pressure selling to persuade you to agree to something without giving you the chance to consider it properly.

What can you do to reduce the number of nuisance calls you receive? Firstly, register with the Telephone Preference Service. The service is free and can reduce the number of unsolicited marketing calls you receive from UK companies. You can register by calling 08450 700707 or by visiting <u>www.tpsonline.org.uk</u>.

Secondly, speak to your telephone service provider to ask what call blocking technology they would recommend. Three Scottish Trading Standards authorities have recently tested some of the latest call blocking devices and found them to be very effective in reducing such nuisance calls. Some telephone providers also offer their own call blocking facilities. There may be a charge involved for such a device.

Thirdly, if you need to give your phone number to a business, make sure you opt out of receiving promotional information from them and third parties by ticking the relevant box on their website or clearly stating this if you are dealing with them on the telephone.

Fourthly, become ex-directory as some businesses use phone directories to compile marketing call lists.

Finally, many nuisance calls originate from overseas so ask your telephone provider to block international calls to your number (although be aware there may be a charge for this service).

Never divulge personal details such as your bank details to a cold caller, regardless of who they claim to be (Police, your bank etc.) and never agree to any loans or credit over the phone.

Dealing with cold callers

When it comes to dealing with pressure selling on the telephone, remember that it is likely they are using this technique because their prices are uncompetitive – they don't want you to have time to compare their prices with other companies. False claims that this is a 'one day only' offer or that the price is hugely discounted are common tactics.

Tell the caller you are not interested and ask them not to contact you again. If they ignore your request, report them to the Information Commissioner (ICO) online at <u>www.ico.org.uk</u> or by phone 0303 1231113. You can also report automated pre-recorded calls to ICO. If possible make a note of the business name, the number they called from, the date and time they called and what they were trying to 'sell' e.g. PPI, accident claim, credit. You should also make the ICO aware of any distress, damage or loss you suffered as a result of these calls.

Chittering

A meeting with Paul Brown a few weeks ago and the opportunity to explore the fascinating and very detailed information he has gathered about Chittering and his family, made me think that it was time that Chittering (which is part of the civil parish of Waterbeach) got a mention in Beach News. Although Paul does not live in the area he is a member of the large family who played an important part in the life of the hamlet and his father and grandfather were born and grew up there. Some of the Brown family still live there today.

Much of the information for this article has come from Paul's publication 'Chittering and Elmeney - A selective report of the history, geography biology and family memories of a fen margin farming hamlet in Cambridgeshire.'

As you travel up or down the A10 between Waterbeach and Ely the traveller whisks past Chittering in a matter of seconds. A blink and you have missed a converted Chapel, a disused pub and a few houses and the turn into School Lane. But it has a history and life of its own and is a part of the civil Parish of Waterbeach. In the past a causeway linked Chittering first to Denny Abbey and thence to Waterbeach village. Signs of the causeway at Denny Abbey are still visible at the Western boundary of the Abbey site and on busy event days forms part of the over flow car park

Although there is evidence of occupation since Roman times and possibly earlier, the Chittering hamlet did not exist as such until the drainage of the fens in the 19th century. Then it grew to become large enough to have a school, a pub (for a short time there were two) a Chapel, and a post office. The school was opened in 1877 and designed to accommodate 70 pupils though at the time average attendance was about 40. Most children stayed until they left to go to work. By the start of WW2 in 1939 there were about 20 children and the school finally closed in1969.

The Chapel was built in 1859 to provide a meeting place for the Baptist congregation who had previously met at first Hawthorne Farm and then Fruit Farm. It was opened by Charles Spurgeon, the famous Baptist preacher, after whom the Chapel in Waterbeach itself is named. The fact that it was a Baptist chapel rather than an Anglican church is evidence of the large number of non-conformists in the area at that time (this was after all Cromwell Country in an earlier century). At its peak there were two Sunday school sessions and two services on a Sunday. In 1905 the Chapel was extended to create another school room which also acted as the village hall. Evening services on a Sunday were still being held in the 1970's and there were still some services during the early 1980's until the chapel was damaged during

a storm. There we no funds to repair it and very few worshippers, so it had to close and was sold in 1986 and became a private residence.

The Pub, the Travellers Rest was far less of a focal point for members of Chittering than the school or the Chapel. It was in existence at least as far back as 1842, but the fact that so many people in Chittering were Baptist and signed the Pledge not to drink alcohol meant that most of the customers were people travelling up and down the A10. It survived longer than the school or the Chapel but now stands empty. There is no sign now of the post office which was a bit further up the road north from the Travellers Rest and was still in existence at least until the late 1970's

The advent of mechanisation with the reduction in the number of people working in agriculture and the ever increasing use of the motor car had a major effect on a small rural hamlet. Although it is very different now from even forty or fifty years ago it still has a distinct identity of its own and you do not have to venture far down School Lane to feel something of a very different time.

Campanology

Summer of 2012 was both a very difficult time and a very rewarding time for me. I had experienced a year of trauma which unfortunately continues but I also was inspired to try a skill which I had often considered - that of campanology. The inspiration came from responding to an invite by Landbeach Bell Ringers to ring a bell for the start of the Olympics - a brave venture in itself of the bell ringers to invite complete novices into the belfry to ring a bell. I was ably instructed to put my hands on the sally with the tail end in my left hand and pull - of course the bell ringer in charge did exactly the same so confidence was already on the up and the bell and I were in no danger! And so my journey started – by Christmas I was able to ring the bells in the band for Christmas morning in a simple 1, 2, 3, 4 and by the beginning of July I was able to ring a variation on the pattern and to achieve the target I had set myself to ring at a friend's wedding made particularly special as the bride and her family were suitably intrigued since they have nothing like it in their home country.

The bell ringing band is friendly, encouraging and patient. Bell ringing is rewarding, challenging and inspirational. I would encourage anyone - young or old - musical or non-musical – unfit or fit to come along to practise sessions and watch or have a try. It is very rewarding and satisfying and even contributes to a fitness programme!!

defend it from several dragons. The children also made smaller castles to take home. This activity was designed to allow the children to practice their scissor skills as they cut castellations in toilet rolls to make towers and gate houses.

To celebrate 'International Talk like a Pirate Day' on September 19th the children dressed up as Pirates. Mums, Dads and carers came into playgroup and took part in pirate themed activities. The children searched for gold doubloons, made pirate hats and decorated biscuits to look like pirate treasure with icing and sweets. Everyone had lots of fun and we raised £26 for Each Children's Hospices.

We are starting to look forward to Christmas. There is a Nativity performance and Christmas party planned for the children and we will have a stall at the PTA Winter Fair. Most excitingly, the children will be adding to the festive decoration around the village with their own artwork stunt. These will be individually decorated posters stuck up in windows. Choose Well this winter

Local residents reminded to Choose Well this winter

Residents in Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire are being reminded to find the right health service for their illness or injury this winter.

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) who commission health services in the area are asking local residents to familiarise themselves with the range of local health services and which illnesses and injuries they can treat. Last year local people using A&E when they didn't need to cost the local NHS £2million, this could have treated 500 heart attack patients or bought 250 hip replacements.

Here's a reminder of what local NHS services can treat.

- Pharmacies can help with bugs and viruses, skin conditions, allergies, pregnancy testing and help with stopping smoking.
- GPs can help with back ache, ear aches, painful coughs, mental health conditions and any illness or injury that won't go away. Make sure that you have your doctor's number to hand. There's also an out of hours GP service which can be accessed by calling your normal doctor's number you will be put straight through or hear a message with the out of hours service number.
- Walk-in centre or minor illness or injury unit these can help with minor burns and scalds, bites and stings, strains and sprains and minor eye or ear problems.
- Or you can look after colds, coughs, sore throats, hangovers, tummy upsets, grazes can all be treated at home with a well-stocked medicine cabinet.

News from Cllr. Peter Johnson

This year we have seen the public consultations for the proposed new town in Waterbeach come to an end with various displays and opportunities for residents to have their say regarding these proposals. I have at every opportunity stressed that Waterbeach must remain a village with its green spaces to maintain the rural feel that comes with a village such as ours. The houses on Cody Road, Capper Road, and Kirby Road are being refurbished and being re-occupied again and that is good to see. These are really good houses and it was criminal to see them standing empty when so many people are looking for houses. It will also be good for our village economy to get these properties occupied again but we have to make sure that the residents of these houses are aware of how much our village has to offer.

Our street lights are still giving cause for concern with some in the village still not working even though new columns have been erected alongside them. I have been told that this is due to the cabling not being up to standard and has to be replaced by EDF, so yet another contractor has to be involved which makes for a longer time to get the lights working. I am still waiting for the missing lamp post in Rosemary Road to be replaced with one for the industrial estate, once all these lights are replaced/repaired then I will do a lighting survey.

Well the long awaited cycle racks at the station are in place and it is hoped that the cyclists who chain their cycles to the railings alongside Lodeside Mobile Home Park will start to use these racks as there are times when the cycles are so many that they start to block the pavement.

I am still working with the Parish Council to get outdoor Gym equipment installed on the Rec. This has been going on for quite a long time but we are slowly getting there and I really hope that this will become a reality next year. I am also working with the Parish Council and the young people of our villages to get our skate park refurbished. The youngsters have shown they really do want a new skate park and are prepared to do fundraising to help achieve this, judging by the enthusiasm shown I have every faith in them. We have had a few meetings and are involving the youngsters where possible as their input will help us to try to create the skate park they want.

New opportunities are being looked at to provide land for more houses in Landbeach to accommodate people with strong local connections. This is not going to be a quick fix but at least it is being looked at. It is nice to hear that Walnut Close has become the desired area it was supposed to be with the disruptive element removed.

The possibility of a car park extension at the old goods yard at Waterbeach station is being closely looked at now with Network Rail in talks with South Cambs District Council Planning officers. I honestly feel that this is close to becoming a reality and hopefully will reduce the amount of cars being parked round the Green, the Gault, and in Lode Avenue.

We have several footpaths in the village that frequently get overgrown, I have cleared some myself as I get fed up waiting for the persons responsible to do the job. Some of these are South Cambs and I chase them at every opportunity, some are residents so if you have a hedge that encroaches the footpath please give it a trim, the last one I cleared this summer was a County Council footpath.

Chittering will be getting its pub back. I would like to think that this is good news for the residents of Chittering as there hasn't been a pub for a few years now. From speaking to people it will open as a pub to start with and then food will be available shortly after. This site has been quite controversial over the past few years with various planning applications but perhaps this new change is what everyone wants, I will be very pleased to get feedback on this.

A final call is to motorists parking in our village, please be aware of the dropped kerbs that are so invaluable for our residents with prams, buggies, and of course users of disabled buggies. When cars block them off it causes great inconvenience to these people.

It is a real privilege and an honour to be elected as a District Councillor to represent you all at South Cambs District Council and for that I say "Thank You". Please remember I work for everyone in our villages so if you have any problems or issues you would like to talk to me about please contact me by whatever means you prefer, telephone, e-mail, or knock on my door, don't forget I am here for all of you.

Keep Waterbeach Rural

Another big thank you to all in Waterbeach, Landbeach and Chittering for helping with the Campaign to let South Cambridgeshire District Council know our views as a community regarding the Local Plan and the proposals for Waterbeach New Town. We could not have done it without you. All of the comments submitted have to be registered against the correct policies on the Council's web-site. Once registered we will each be sent a formal confirmation. The representations will then be available for sight by the public. There have been 8,000 representations made in total but we don't know yet how many were lodged by our area. We hope to find out by the end of November 2013.

The Planning Policy and Localism Portfolio Holder Councillor Pippa Corney will consider the issues raised by the representations during early Spring 2014 and assess whether the Plan is ready for submission to the Secretary of State for examination. Should anything more than minor changes need to be made then a further round of public consultation will be required extending the adoption timetable.

Once the Portfolio Holder considers that the Plan is ready to be submitted for examination she will recommend to a meeting of full Council to agree the Submission Local plan. Wonder what happens if Councillors vote against the motion?

Once the local Plan is submitted an independent Planning Inspector will be appointed to hold an examination to consider the "soundness" of The Local Plan. This will include considering the representations received by the Council from the recent consultation and holding a series of public hearings where the Inspector will decide if more information is necessary to come to a final decision that the Plan be adopted. This should take place during Summer/Autumn 2014.

The Local Plan is on the District Council's web-site but have to say that it is very complex and you need to know what to look for. Also would say that for the public it is a bit of a hard ask for us to comment when everything is in "planning speak" and not plain English. Follow this link:-

Army Cadets

Waterbeach detachment is a small thriving detachment located at the Cadet Training Centre just off Denny End Road. We parade on a Tuesday night at 7:30pm to 9:45pm. We get up to lots of exciting and interesting things and there is ample opportunity for our cadets to try strange and wonderful activities as well as army style training. It's the only youth group where young people can receive army style training. Here are a few of the things we can get up to whilst at detachment and also on regular camps.

On a detachment night cadets can enjoy lessons such as skill at arms which teaches cadets how to use rifles correctly and safely before we let them onto a range. They learn how to camouflage themselves so when we are living out in the field over a weekend camp they can hide from other troops and the adult staff. We also teach drill and marching so cadets can learn how to be self-disciplined and how to take pride in themselves and their uniform. We also teach vital skills such as first aid and cadets can also take part in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award. All the skills that cadets learn in their career with us are fantastic life skills.

On weekend camps we usually take the cadets to Thetford Forest where they learn field tactics and field craft so they know how to live and survive when they are out in the forest. They also get to take part in field exercises where they are able to carry rifles around with them.

Every year the cadets get to go on an annual camp to camps all over the UK. This year Cambridgeshire Army Force Cadet went to Swynnerton camp up in Staffordshire where they then are split into different training groups depending on how far they have progressed in cadets. I was working with the senior cadets where we spent most of the time out in the



field for field craft training. All the cadets really enjoyed the training and always enjoy annual camp because it's so jam packed full of activities and adventure.

Our most recent event that the cadets have taken part in was the remembrance parade in the village. The cadets really enjoy this day as they feel proud to support our troops both fallen and still serving. As a new Troop



Commander I felt extremely proud of them all. Fen Edge Archaeology Group

The Fen Edge Archaeology Group (FEAG) began in 2008 with the aim of giving anyone who is interested the chance to get involved in archaeology and promote interest in archaeology in the villages of the Fen Edge Patch, Waterbeach, Landbeach, Cottenham, Rampton and Willingham. Our major venture is the 'Twenty Pence Project', an exploration of part of a Romano-British settlement north of Cottenham. For two weeks each July since 2011, we have dug test pits and trenches to study features revealed by geophysics. We have excavated several ditches and found that they contained a wide variety of pottery – over 40 different types from the Roman period or earlier – as well as cow, sheep/goat, horse and pig bones (archaeologists love

ditches and the rubbish accumulated in them!) The weather played its part in how much we achieved this year. The topsoil was removed by machine and the subsoil baked hard in the hot, dry conditions, providing a different challenge from last year's prolonged rain. A real surprise was the discovery of a straightedged feature which might mark the site of a corn-drying oven or malting floor; further excavation will be needed to investigate this. Participants included members of FEAG and members of other local archaeology groups – everyone was welcome whatever their level of experience.

If you are interested in history or archaeology, come and join us, for talks, visits or fieldwork. The first speaker meeting of 2014 will be on

National Heritage Pear Project

Help save the UK's historic pear trees!

The National Heritage Pear Project was launched at RHS Garden Harlow Carr in Harrogate on 16 November 2013. The aim is to record the location of, identify and conserve surviving old pear trees. Pear trees can live for up to 400 years! Another part of the project is to build a pear identification web site based on the successful FruitID (<u>http://www.fruitid.com/</u>) which already covers many common apple varieties (170) with many more descriptions and photographs in the pipeline.

While many pear varieties came from the continent there were also many varieties bred in East Anglia particularly in Sawbridgeworth from 1860 to 1900 including the well-known Conference pear and Bedford in the early 1900s with several Laxton varieties. There are no "Cambridgeshire" Pears listed by the East of England Apple and Orchards Project but perhaps some may yet be discovered. For the past 50 years the acreage of traditional orchards in the UK has been steadily decreasing, with an estimated loss in area of 60 per cent nationally since 1950, and looking at old maps of Waterbeach you can see little remains of the orchards that used to surround the village.

Please email me <u>kate@ninetiles.com</u> if you have a veteran pear tree or know of one locally and if you have additional information such as its history, variety etc. that would be very helpful. I will be acting as an editor for some of the pages of "PearID" and it would be nice to get local varieties well represented from the beginning.

I have also helped Cambridgeshire Orchard Group when they have been "ground truthing" records of the location of traditional orchards in Cambridge using data from land use records, aerial photos etc. and comparing this information with what actually still exists. (Traditional orchards are defined, for priority habitat purposes, as groups of fruit and nut trees planted on vigorous rootstocks at low densities in permanent grassland; and managed in a low intensity way). Do you have 5 or more veteran fruit trees on your land, or does your garden have one or more fruit trees that were once part of a larger orchard and together with the trees in your neighbour's gardens would make a group of 5 or more? Again please email me with details so that I can help make sure Landbeach and Waterbeach orchard records are accurate.

Crime Prevention

Police are urging residents to take crime prevention measures this winter as part of a campaign against burglary.

Properties are generally broken into from the rear because the burglar doesn't want to be seen so people should make it as difficult as possible to access their back garden. Tall fencing, noisy gravel, spiky hedges and an alarm system are all worth the investment. And of course, windows and doors should always be locked when there is no one at home.

Other crime prevention measures include:

- Remove keys from window and door locks, but keep them in a familiar and safe place where all members of the family know where to find them in the event of an emergency.
- Never leave items such as keys, bags and money on show through a window, as these can prove a real temptation for an opportunist burglar.
- Consider the position of key racks or shelves next to doors and ensure that they cannot be reached through the letter box.
- Use timer switches to turn on lights and radios when you are going to be away from your house at dusk.
- Consider the use of lights at the front and rear of your property that are activated when someone approaches.
- Consider the use of bolts and padlocks on side gates. Place the bolts at the top, middle and bottom of the gate, as just a top bolt might be easy to reach and open.
- Consider chaining together all high value items stored in outbuildings, as this will make it harder for them to be removed. Also consider the use of a wireless alarm or link your shed or garage into an existing home intruder alarm system.
- Homeowners are urged to check their home insurance policies to ensure their property meets the security standards required. Insurance companies often refuse to pay out if properties do not meet these standards or are left unsecured.
- Don't leave pets' food and water outside the house if you are out at work, as it can indicate that no-one is at home.
- Don't leave car engines running whilst windows defrost and you nip inside for the rest of your breakfast. Last year folk did.....and you can guess what happened!
- Remind elderly and vulnerable people not to let people in without checking ID unless they know who they are.



Watch your waste, not your waist

Christmas is traditionally a time for generosity, indulgence and feasting. We love to give beautifully wrapped gifts, feed family and friends and eat our own bodyweight in festive fodder.

It's not only our waistlines that gain weight at Christmas, festive bins are the heaviest and fattest of the year, with an extra 750,000 tonnes of waste in England alone compared to the rest of the year. That's an increase of around 30 per cent and is generally made up of food waste, glass bottles, packaging and gift wrap. To make it as easy and convenient as possible for you to recycle and compost

your festive waste, here are a few tips:

Blue Bin

Most packaging can be placed in the blue bin, including;

- Glass bottles and jars
- Tins and cans
- Cardboard (large pieces can be flattened and placed next to your blue bin for collection)
- Greeting cards
- Gift wrap (all types)
- Plastic pots, tubs, trays
- Plastic packaging
- Plastic film (all types as long as clean)

If your blue bin is full, extra recycling can be placed out for collection in a cardboard box or returnable container.

Paper Caddy

- Newspapers
- Magazines
- Leaflets
- Greeting card envelopes

Green Bin

- All food waste (cooked or raw)
- Real Christmas trees (only when cut up and placed inside the bin)

If you follow these simple steps, your black bin should remain practically empty with only non-recyclable and non-compostable items, such as polystyrene and nappies.

Advice from Trading Standards

Buying a second-hand car?

At Trading Standards, the most frequent type of consumer complaint we receive relates to the purchase of second-hand cars. They are one of the most expensive purchases we make and many of us are dependent on them for going about our daily lives. As a result it can be a daunting process to buy a second-hand car. Below we provide some advice to help you.

Check before you buy

- Check the validity of the MOT on <u>VOSA's website</u> and check the car's details are correct on the MOT certificate. If it states there were advisory points, make sure you see the details so that you know what work is likely to be needed before the next MOT.
- Check the VOSA website to check the vehicle has not been recalled.
- Check its service history. How often has it been serviced, and has it been serviced in line with the manufacturer's recommendations?
- Carry out an <u>HPI</u> check to make sure there is no outstanding finance on the car that could lead to it being repossessed by the finance company. An HPI check will also tell you if the car has been written off or if it is stolen.
- In terms of physically checking the car, carry out a walk around check and test drive the car. If you are not mechanically minded we would also strongly recommend you have the car checked by an engineer.

Your rights against the seller - If you buy from a private seller, your rights are limited if you find a fault with the car after buying it. The seller must have the right to sell the car and the car must be 'as described', but other than that you have no recourse if things go wrong with it.

By comparison, if you purchase the car from a trader, again they must have title to the car and it must be 'as described' but in addition it must be of satisfactory quality, taking into account its age, mileage, condition etc. For instance, it would be reasonable to expect a brand new car to be free from wear and tear issues when you buy it. However if you were to buy a ten year old car with a mileage of over 100,000 then naturally there will be wear and tear on the vehicle. If faults arise due to wear and tear, it is unlikely you will have any recourse against the trader. Where a fault occurs which is not due to wear and tear, you may be able to seek a repair by the trader in the first instance.

The rights explained above are in addition to any rights you may have under a warranty.
